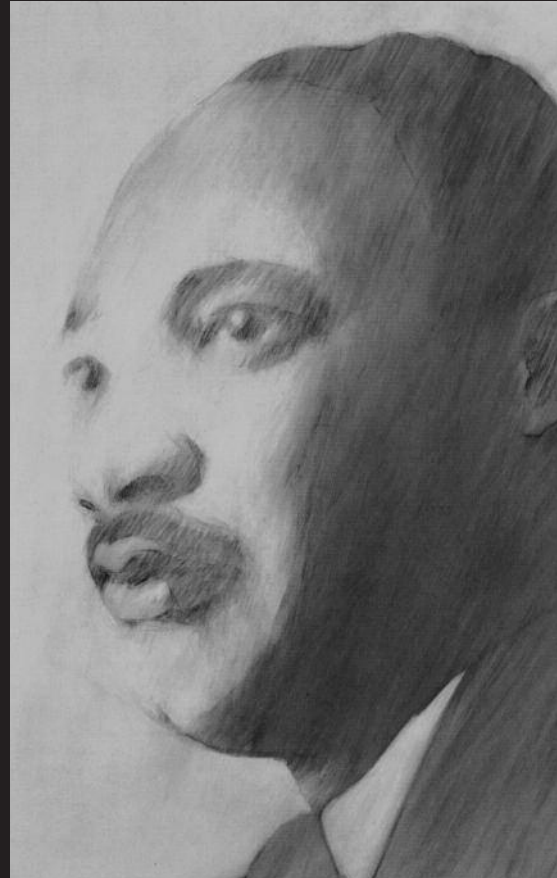

KINGIAN NONVIOLENCE EDUCATORS

Richard Tarlaian is a Senior Nonviolence Trainer, from the Center for Nonviolence and Peace Studies at the University of Rhode Island. Mr. Tarlaian retired Police Captain from the Providence Police Department. He is a US Army veteran. He currently serves as Adjunct Faculty at the Community College of Rhode Island. Mr. Tarlaian has traveled extensively over the past ten years, leading Nonviolence trainings in England, Nigeria, and South Africa, with Dr. Bernard LaFayette, former strategist for Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Victoria Christgau — Founder/Director of the emerging CT Center for Nonviolence, A Martin Luther King, Jr. Institute. Certified as a LEVEL III Kingian Nonviolence trainer by Dr. Bernard LaFayette, Jr. from the University of Rhode Island's Center for Nonviolence and Peace Studies. Working as a Peace/Arts Educator for over 25 years, she uses music as a path towards peace, conducting workshops, performances and nonviolence trainings for people of all ages across the county. Some venues include: The United Nations, Trinity College, University of Connecticut, at The University of Rhode Island, HOT School Summer Institute, CEA Leadership Conference and others.

Deacon Arthur Miller is an author, radio host, revivalist, nationally known speaker and retired businessman. Currently the director of the Office for Black Catholic Ministries for the Archdiocese of Hartford. In addition to his assigned parishes, he is also the Catholic chaplain at Hartford's Capital Community College. He speaks widely at public forums, houses of worship, schools and universities addressing issues of social injustice. Miller was 10 years old in 1955 when his schoolmate Emmett Till, age 14, was brutally murdered in Mississippi. His book "The Journey to Chatham", details the historic events seen through the eyes of Emmett's friends. He is the Hartford Archdiocese representative to the Connecticut Coalition to Save Darfur, a group formed specifically to influence state, national, and international officials and institutions to use their political clout to stop the conflict in Darfur, Sudan. Deacon Miller is a Level I certified Kingian Nonviolence-trainer/educator working closely with the CT Center for Nonviolence.

Pastor James A. Lane, Jr., Founder and Pastor of The Northend Church of Christ/The Urban Mission, Inc., in Hartford, CT, where he has been serving the Church and community for over 30 years. Founder of The Buddy Breakfast Program — a Manhood Training Mentoring Program for inner city males; 2 Way Youth Project — and co-founder of The Men of Color, Initiative. Mr. Lane has a BA in Sacred Literature & Theology from the School from the Ministry, Rutland, VT and a MA in Community Psychology from the University of New Haven, Graduate Center. He has specialized training in numerous areas of counseling. He appears as guest lecturer for many schools, churches and colleges across the nation. Some of Mr. Lane's published works include: "Racism in American Churches", "As Our Topsy — Turvey Work Turns", Theological Response, "Why Do Bad Things Happen To Good People", Death & Dying, presented at the University of New Haven, Graduate Center. Pastor Lane is a Level I certified Kingian Nonviolence educator/trainer working closely with the Connecticut Center for Nonviolence.
