Sunday, November 22nd Recap by Kayla Costenoble - This is not the same USH community I joined in 1976. Our ministers now preach sermons about never-before-mentioned subjects such as transgender persons, as Rev. Cathy did on November 15, 2015. And for this I say, praise be.

Rayla's Time for All Ages story was for the kids overflowing the Chancel steps, the soup-making youth sitting on the floor nearby, and for us in the pews. It described three young persons who were doing things they really did not want to do and acting in ways they really did not want to act because their outsides did not match their insides and they were struggling to let the world see who they truly were.

Many of us at Sunday's service learned a lot. We learned that the term "transgender" (often called "trans") is used to describe a person's gender identity that doesn't necessarily match their assigned sex at birth. We learned that personal pronouns can be a problem for transgender persons. Two of the most commonly used are ze (or zie) and hir for singular gender-neutral pronouns.



We were awed by the honest, personal and well-presented testimonies by two in our midst. Prior to the sermon, youth group member Orion Howard, a 15 year-old high school sophomore passionate about social justice, spoke about his journey. He began experiencing changes in his gender, began dressing as a male, and realized he had never really felt like a girl. Orion uses the word "agender" to describe himself, a word meaning not wanting to associate with any gender (and yes, it's in the dictionary). "No one can find my gender but me; every trans person is unique," hir said. Orion feels hir is coming to grips with every aspect of life. (Note: Orion also served as one of the four candle-givers during the Candles of

Memory and Hope part of the service.)

Rev. Cathy said that for almost four years now, she and Rev. Heather have been asked, regarding Robin, “Is that a boy or a girl?” Their answer, “A girl, for now.” And their question is, “Why does it matter so much what sex or gender my child is?” Robin is also often described by others as being “cute or beautiful” rather than what her parents would describe as “strong and independent.” As Rev. Cathy remarked, “But whoa, is she strong and independent!”

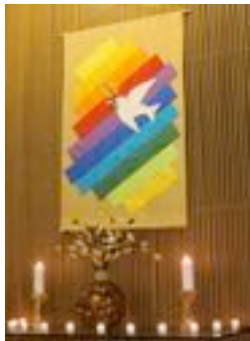
“I am breaking gender rules every day,” Rev. Cathy said. She said she does not dress or act as a lady, does not like being called a lady, buys most of her clothes from the men’s section of stores, identifies as “gender queer” and does not fit easily into any category..



But clothing can, indeed, become a problem, as it did when Rev. Cathy was asked to become a “bridesmaid” at her brother’s wedding; she became “horribly anxious” as “they” tried to find an appropriate outfit for her. Finally, she wore a vest of the same material as the bridesmaids’ dresses, black pants and a white shirt. Unfortunately, this did not make anyone happy.

Many are “too something” to fit the ideal of the mythical norm,” Rev. Cathy said. We have to understand gender as a spectrum including the “beautiful, unique whole self.” Discriminatory values can be attached to the words masculinity and femininity, such as having to check “M” or “F” in gender boxes on forms.

But the issue goes much deeper. Rev. Cathy told us the true tale of Leslie Feinburg, who came to a hospital with a very high fever, but the doctor refused treatment because she was a transgender person. Transgender persons are six times more likely to experience discrimination and physical violence than those who are not transgender. Rev. Cathy then read a too-long list of names of those whose lives had been brutally ended because they had broken gender rules. Most were under 25 years old; all were gender outlaws. Rev. Cathy concluded, “Let us open our hearts to gender diversity. Let our genders be a bit more fluid and not limited by the mythical norm of what it means to be a man or a woman.”



Wonderful words in prose and poetry almost always enrich our Sunday services. Rev. Cathy read “Telling” by Laura Hersey, the wheel-chair bound (with MS) late writer, poet, speaker and disability rights activist.

A sample: What you risk telling your story: You will bore them. Your voice will break, your ink will spill and stain your coat. No one will understand, their eyes become fences.

You will park yourself forever on the outside, your differentness once and for all revealed, dangerous,

the names you give to yourself will become epithets.

In “Love First,” a reflection written in 2006, UU Minister Rebecca Parker wrote, “Love demands justice; it can’t simply be an emergency strategy when everything has gone wrong...Maybe in the end love will save us all, but it has a lot better chance at the beginning...Let us make love the first—not the last—resort.”

And then there were the words on the cover of our Order of Service, written by Chaz Bono, only child of Sonny and Cher, LGBT advocate, writer, musician and transgender man: “There’s a gender in your brain and a gender in your body. For 99 percent of people, these things are in alignment. For transgender people, they’re mismatched. That’s all it is. It’s not complicated, it’s not a neurosis. It’s a mix-up. It’s a birth defect, like a cleft palate.”

Sunday’s service was just two days after the horror of the attacks and deaths in France. Rev. Cathy put into words all we were feeling, as she said, “We light this chalice as a beacon of hope after this weekend’s experience. Our hearts ache today for all the violence in the world.” - **Kayla Costenoble**

Syrian Refugee Resettlement Help - A number of us at the Unitarian Society have been exploring what the congregation might do to help the large numbers of refugees from Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan and a number of African countries in resettling here.



We have contacted refugee resettlement agencies in New Haven and Hartford who have experience and support resources. We are identifying other congregations in the Hartford area with whom we might partner.

To resettle a family a number of support items are required (e.g.): rent for 4-6 months, furnishing the apartment with donated goods, help in obtaining employment, help to learn English, settling children in schools, getting health care, driving to appointments, acclimating to the area, government paperwork, etc. How much of this we might undertake as a congregation alone or with others, or as individuals is to be determined.

We are now seeking to enlist other interested church members in this exploration.

Help bring solar power to USH!



&



Background

In keeping with the Unitarian Society of Hartford's commitment to be a Green Sanctuary and to our 7th principle, an ad hoc group, the Solar Stewardship Work Group, is researching the technical and financial possibility of purchasing a solar system for USH. This information sheet will review our understanding and vision as of November 2015. We invite you to join us!

Technical Considerations

We have been advised that it is feasible to have a free-standing, ground-based solar system located between the Memorial Garden and the wooded area. Hartford zoning rules permit a ground-based system as long as it is not in front of the building and its area is less than 50% of the footprint of the building. Our system would meet these conditions. The Building and Grounds Committee has passed a motion supporting such an installation. In addition, Rayla has confirmed the location will not impinge on the children's outdoor play area.

Financial Considerations

All members and friends of USH will have an opportunity to contribute to this project; we will need many people to help fund it! The project to install a system large enough to provide an amount of electricity equivalent to that which USH uses in a year will cost approximately \$160,000 to \$195,000 (including associated fees); therefore, we will need some people to make substantial contributions.

Many solar installations are eligible for a 30% federal tax credit that is not available to a non-profit such as the USH. Therefore, we are exploring the formation of an LLC in order to get the maximum possible benefits to USH at the minimum cost to the individuals making large contributions to the project. The LLC would initially own the equipment and the power it generates. The solar power generated would be donated to USH at no or minimal cost. In approximately five years, the LLC and the equipment would be donated to USH.

The individual members of an LLC can apply the solar-installation tax credit to their personal tax returns. In addition, the LLC may be able to sell Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) to the electric utility as well as take depreciation on the system.

Even with these advantages, the members of the LLC will be making a considerable contribution to USH. We anticipate that the financial incentive—enabling a larger contribution at less expense—will encourage individuals to contribute to this project in addition to their contributions to the annual stewardship drive.

Members in an LLC must be “accredited investors.” Increasing the number of members increases accountant fees, disclosure documents, etc., so it is desirable to keep the group small. An Accredited Investor is one with an income of at least \$200,000 per year over the most recent two years OR assets of over \$1 million, excluding a home.

Issues Addressed

1. The ethics of the LLC taking tax credits when USH is a non-profit has been addressed by Reverends Cathy and Heather in consultation with their colleagues who have done this at other UU congregations.
2. The Endowment Committee has concluded that any possible loss of contributions would be offset by the possible reduction in operating expenses to which the endowment continues to contribute.
3. The Board of Directors approved a proposal from the Solar Stewardship Workgroup at its November meeting, signaling approval of the concept and its willingness to enter into an agreement with an LLC when it is formed.

Next Steps

Stu Spence, David Newton, and Jeff Howard have selected an installer. They are working with the company representative to determine what the final layout will be. Also, they will determine what details will need to be included in an agreement between the provider and the LLC. Richard Groothuis, David Newton, and Jim Venneman are working with lawyers and accountants to research the formation of an LLC—and the associated tax, RECs, and depreciation implications—and to develop agreements between the LLC, USH, and the solar installer.
