**Sunday Service Recaps by Kayla Costenoble - Joy – Finding It, Holding It, and Knowing You Deserve It - September 4, 2016** - It was a warm-but-not-hot Sunday on September 4, 2016. It was bright, sunny and beautiful. It was Labor Day weekend, when we don't have to work. And Pulpit Guest Patrice Fitzgerald gave us "permission to feel joy." Together with her husband, Richard Leslie, our pulpit guests told their stories, read poems, sang, and made us really feel good.

Richard said that every time he stands on the pulpit, he looks up and is thankful for the people who made our beautiful church. "Joy can come to you unexpectedly," he said, and told of a day he and his son went kite flying. With twice the amount of string normally on the kite—400 feet—it soon belonged to the Oregon coast. It became a moment to stop what you are doing, realize the reality of what you are doing and find the serendipity and mystery in joy. Although our egos make it difficult to find joy, Richard said, you can find it by taking ordinary things, like brushing your teeth, and giving your whole attention to it. It will not only provide joy, but can also make you a better listener and give you "focus and second-sight."

Patrice acknowledged that our New England Puritanism can make it hard to find joy and feel we deserve to be happy. We don't have to be happy every moment and don't have to be outside our real life to feel joy. She urged us to "look at life every day and think of our moments of joy and happiness" which will allow us to recognize and share these moments. She described such a recent moment when five members and a guitarist from the USH's choir visited our late long-time member Sid Garvais. "We were singing him out," she said, and as they sang, they got better and better, the room lightened, and they were transformed by joy, even in the presence of death. Their final song was "Amazing Grace." Sid died later that night.

Patrice read Anne Sexton's "Welcome Morning." Some words:

There is joy in all:

in the hair I brush each morning,

in the Cannon towel, newly washed,

that I rub my body with each morning,

in the chapel of eggs I cook each morning,

in the outcry from the kettle that heats my coffee each morning,

in the spoon and the chair that cry "hello there, Anne"

each morning...

Richard read David Budbill's "The First Green of Spring." Some words:

Out walking in the swamp picking cowslip, marsh marigold,  
 this sweet first green of spring. Now sautéed in a pan melting  
 to a deeper green that ever they were alive, this green, this life...  
 And even though we know we are growing old, we are dying, we  
 will never be young again, we also know we're still right here  
 now, today, and oh my! don't these greens taste good.

Worship Associate Rick Tsukada led us in Mary Oliver's responsive reading 536 (our Hymnal offers so much!) "Morning Poem:"

Each morning the world is created...  
 each pond with its blazing lilies is a prayer heard and answered lavishly,  
 every morning,  
 whether or not you have ever dared to be happy,  
 whether or not you have ever dared to pray.

Patrice read Li-Young Lee's "From Blossoms":

There are days we live as if death were nowhere in the background:  
 from joy to joy to joy, from wing to wing,  
 from blossom to blossom to impossible blossom, to sweet impossible  
 blossom.

Richard sang "Silent Noon," a poem written by Dante Rossetti and set to music by Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1903:

...So this wing'd hour is dropt to us from above. Oh! Clasp we to our  
 hears, for deathless dower, This close-companioned inarticulate hour  
 when twofold silence was the song of love.



I've been engaged in ministry on the front lines of the movement for social justice, connecting the Moral Monday movement with the movement for Black Lives. This movement has called me not only to continue in the prophetic preaching and teaching with houses of worship and temples of faith, but also to the streets in the act of sacred activism in places like Ferguson, Baltimore, Hartford, New Haven, Bridgeport and beyond...the work of faith that is rooted in the deepest concerns for God's human family.

Our friend, brother and colleague, The Rev. Dr. William Barber, II is coming to Connecticut, September 8th to deliver an address regarding the work of our shared faith traditions with public policies rooted in the moral values of justice and fairness. He has led the call for faith leaders like yourselves to become fusion-movement leaders that we together may freshen the great wellsprings of our democracy based on past moral movements and great progressive victories in our history. On September 8th, Rev. Barber will join us for a revival and call to action beginning at 6:30 pm on the campus of Central Connecticut State University (CCSU), Welte Auditorium.

**Nuts and Bolts:** The member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association covenant to affirm and promote: the inherent worth and dignity of every person; justice, equity, and compassion in human relations; acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations; a free and responsible search for truth and meaning; the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process, within our congregations and in society at large; the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all; respect for the interdependent web of all existence, of which we are a part.
