

Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble ~ January 22, 2017 "Courage and Compliance"

Sunday, January 22, 2017, was the day after the incredible and overwhelming Women's March (plus many men and countless children) which took place not only in Washington, Boston, New York, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Astoria, Oregon, and Hartford, CT, etc., but also all over the world!

This was one of the reasons why Worship Associate Rick Tsukada began welcoming and recognizing visitors to the USH Sunday service with an audible deep sigh and the words, "Long week, huh"? His welcome, he said, was truly for all of us—members, visitors, and to the millions in the world who met on the same day when "no one in the planet was left behind or untouched."

Rev. Cathy began her sermon with another deep sigh, confessing that she didn't know what the weekend was going to hold, as she, Rev. Heather and Robin, were among the 10,000 who gathered in Hartford, in what turned out to be the largest single-day protest in several decades—estimated to be over three million people around the world.

To assuage her fears about the many who will suffer under the U.S.'s new president, Rev. Cathy said she has been reading books about Nazi Germany, not the prison camps, but about the ordinary people who resisted because "every life matters." She told about the Bielski partisans, an organization of Jewish partisans who fought against the Nazi German occupiers in German-occupied Poland (now Western Belarus) and rescued Jews from extermination. Under this remarkable rescue mission, 1,236 Jews survived the war, living more than two years in the forest.

We also learned about Le Chambon-sur-Lignon, a Protestant Huguenot village in Southern France, which, during World War II, became a haven for Jews fleeing from the Nazis and their French collaborators. The Chambonais hid Jews in their homes, provided forged I.D.s and ration cards and helped then over the border to Switzerland, acting on their conviction that it was their duty to help their neighbors in need. "They thought what they were doing was ordinary," Rev. Cathy said.

"They had the courage to put their values first." Rev. Cathy said. "Would I have made the same choice? What would help us to get such courage? As an example of compliance, she reminded us that before 911, boarding an airplane and greeting arrivals was so easy. Now, the "new normal" is complicated and denied to many. She feels that the bar will continue to move, and we may have to choose, at some point, to yield or resist.

We have to be ready to use non-violence to not comply. This involves preparation, organization, deep roots, and strong branches. We cannot do it alone. Now is the time to get crystal-clear about our values so we would know what to do about disobeying authority. We must name the values we hold dear, recognize our privilege, build relationships outside our safety zones and "resist and protest in thousands of different ways." Although we know that we are a committed and courageous group, we must "strengthen our spiritual muscle," Rev. Cathy said. She also said that, a year from now, she hopes she will be able to say "we don't need this."

There was an especially meaningful quote in the Order of Service by Caitlin Breedlove, known across social justice movements as a leader, strategist, and writer connecting LGBTQ, racial and economic justice. She was appointed Campaign Director of Standing on the Side of Love in January 2016. She writes: "Compliance is so seductive a response because it involves simply going along

with a force already in motion...Non-compliance means we have to reckon with what evils we cannot stomach."

Rev. Cathy read a January 18, 2017, Unitarian Universalist Association's "Declaration of Conscience" which said, in part:

At this extraordinary time in our nation's history, we are called to affirm our profound commitment to the fundamental principles of justice, equity and compassion, to truth and core values of American society...We will oppose any and all unjust government action to deport, register, discriminate, or despoil... As people of conscience, we declare our commitment to translate our values into action as we stand on the side of love with the most vulnerable among us.

Copies of the Declaration were available and we were urged to add our names to the document by going to www.UUA.org and committing ourselves to putting our UU values into action to resist hate, fear, and bigotry.

Sunday's music really fit the service; it was from all over the world. Our gathering song, "Thula Klizeo" was a chant written by South African Joseph Shabalala, founder of Ladysmith Black Mambazo. Its Zulu translation: Be still my heart, even here I am at home. "That should wake us up," Rev. Cathy commented after several vigorous rounds.

We sang words written by Romantic poet James Russell Lowell in 1845 in "Once to Every Soul (this word was originally 'Man') and Nation"

Once to every soul and nation comes the moment to decide, In the strife of truth with falsehood for the good or evil side: Then to stand with truth is noble...

Our choir did a stirring, plaintive rendition of "I'll Cover You" from Broadway's hit rock musical "Rent."

...I think they meant it
When they said you can't buy love
Now I know you can rent it
A new lease you are my love
One life, all my life...

Isaac Reguera's playing of Chopin's "Prelude No. 20 in C minor" continued to remind us how fortunate we are to have him with us at the USH.

It was quite a service.



The Women's March in Washington:
From your on-sight Reporter, Diana
Heymann ~ 1400 buses* were
assigned parking at JFK Stadium. It's a
3-mile walk to the Mall from there. Most
folks got a Metro ticket. They recorded
close to 500,000 riders on
Saturday...more than any day ever! To
see buses from everywhere in the Union
was amazing. (There was signage on
every bus to let us know from where they
came)

* 99% of the buses were the big ones. There were 3 buses at Trinity that were Dattco double deckers. We left at 1:40

am Saturday morning and arrived back at Trinity at 2:40 am on Sunday. The ride down and back, though long, was OK for me because I just slept. I was amazed and relieved as 3 Black Lives Matter folks from Hartford were on my bus. I spent the entire day with them. That was beautiful and so special.

I wore my hat as did at least half of the ralliers/marchers. It was amazing from a bird's eye view to see the sea of pink. It was even more beautiful to be part of such an outcry for human rights and moral values. These multitudes were all speaking the same language...every concern was addressed briefly from the podium during the Rally...even celebrities stayed on point. The musical choices were also short and protest-based. Gandhi and King would feel proud that their message has been heard and heeded. There was not one arrest. When the crowd roared I could hear it echo hugely right to my core! There were so many people no one could move. There were 3 huge screens set up on Independence Avenue with loud speakers so that at some points most of us could see and hear. The Mall was as crowded as Independence Ave. There was nowhere to march...the crowds stretched all the way to the White House. The Park Service had to make false openings in the barricades so that there could be movement. It took quite a while for them to get that done. The signs were inventive and everyone was taking pictures of them and admiring the art and creativity. And the drumming...it helped me to keep focused and moving even if it was only my body moving in my limited space. I got to talk to so many people: everyone from babies to the elderly and those in wheelchairs seemed not only happy to be there, but also aware of staying connected to their buddies and being patient and understanding of our mutual plight. When we were finely able to move up to 14th Street and across to the Mall (just below the Nat'l Monument), everyone felt relief. Standing on a rise on the Mall above 14th St., I watched a seemingly endless mass of marchers that kept coming across from Independence Ave. The

most beautiful was a huge group of Native Americans behind a blue banner that stretched and waved across the entire road, flying above them a mass of enormous and colorful balloons. Just as we came across to the Mall we faced the new museum of African American History/culture/art. It was breathtaking. We so wanted to go but did not know that we needed to get tickets on-line ahead of time. We did not even wait that long when we finally succumbed to porta potty lines.(Hold your breath, don't look around and get in and out as fast as possible!) We got to walk back up the Mall and then across it to the Smithsonian Metro station because the crowds, once moving, just seemed to fade away...

When we finally got back to find our bus at day's end and regardless of the fact that the lot was virtually empty at the beginning of the day and totally full at the end, I found our bus easily. We waited for 2 college-age youngsters who were in a total panic because they could not find us. It was a huge relief for all when they arrived. You were all with me in spirit. -Image: Wikipedia



*Cathy is severely allergic to peanuts and peanut oil, so please make sure there is no interaction with peanuts in the food you prepare.

*Robin is gluten-sensitive so please use gluten-free versions of entrees.

*They are not vegetarian: protein is much appreciated! They tend to like: enchiladas, little burgers, mashed potatoes/casseroles, salads of all kinds (pasta, bean, green), chicken, tofu, etc. They love to try new things and try not to be too picky! Note: As well as peanuts and gluten, they avoid mushrooms, eggplant, olives, and nutty things.

*They live at 113 Washington Circle, the little circle-street off Park Road (think: A.C. Peterson's) in West Hartford. They have an enclosed front porch--when you take them a meal, plan to leave it on the front porch. They'll have a note up about whether they are sleeping or not. Please label your dishes with your name if you'd like them returned, keeping in mind that things can get a little disorganized in New Baby-Landia!
