Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble April 2, 2017

"A Glint of Goodness"

It's definitely not your usual Sunday at the Unitarian Society of Hartford when a minister or guest, invited to deliver the Time for All Ages message to the children (and, let's face it, to the entire congregation), begins with "Growing up queer, church was not always such a welcome place for me."

But that's exactly what Special Guest James Lecesne, novelist, actor, screenwriter and current star of his one-person show, The Absolute Brightness of Leonard Pelkey at the Hartford Stage, did in his talk here on April 2, 2017. So what brought this magnetic actor to us? According to the theater's Stage Notes for the production:

The Unitarian Society of Hartford is a justice-seeking inclusive community and a longtime friend of the arts in Hartford. The theme of "Absolute Brightness" by James Lecesne resonates with the congregation's Co-Ministers and they initiated a partnership with Hartford Stage.

Or, as Rev. Heather blurted out in her opening words to James when she met him earlier this week, "Hi, nice to meet you. How do you do it all?"

Perched on a high stool on the Chancel, with the kids spread out in front of him on the steps and on the floor, James said he first considered doing some acting for us but instead wrote "a true story about himself" to read to us. He could do this, he said, knowing he would be "allowed to read it here without trouble." He told us he grew up a gay boy in a New Jersey suburb but kept his identity a secret because he had no words to describe what he was to his parents. But he never believed he was evil, had a mental disease, was an animal, a criminal, a sinner, or was crazy.

He first heard the word "homosexual" when he was 15, which made him feel that he had "found his tribe" and was no longer alone. At the age of 20, he was told by someone he "would never make it big in this business; you're too gay. Gay will get you nowhere." This goes on for years but, as he told us, "I went on to make it big. So there." The New York Times has called him "among the most talented solo performers of his (or any) generation."

James played a troubled young man named Trevor in his award-winning 1995 play "Word of Mouth" and also wrote the screenplay for his Academy Award winning film "Trevor." This led to his 1998 founding, with producers Peggy Rajski and Randy Stone, of The Trevor Project, the first and still only national suicide prevention and crisis intervention lifeline for LGBTQ youth.

He spoke highly of Jazz Jennings, now a transgender teenager, whose reality TV show and children's book "I Am Jazz" have made her an ambassador for transgender kids and for the HRC (Human Rights Campaign). On April 28, 2016, there was a nationwide reading of her book.

"All of us need all of us to make it," was Rev. Heather's repeated mantra during her sermon. She said when we don't say anything when bad things happen, we are struggling against centuries of small-town thinking and our each-town-for-itself mentality.

She talked about the current diversity controversy in the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the resignation of Rev. Peter Morales, first Latino president of the UUA, which took place April 1, three months before his term was

to end. In his resignation letter Rev. Morales wrote, "It is past time for us to examine more deeply than we ever have the patterns of institutional racism that are embedded in our practices of leadership, including hiring."

Rev. Heather said, "We can do better than that, and can rise up to a higher level of engagement" with what is going on in the rest of the world. Every action matters, she said and you "have to stretch yourself out of your comfort zone." We must embrace our universal fragility to change the course of things, take a stand, find the courage to come forward to do the right thing, and "ask new questions of ourselves, each other, and our leaders."

USH choir member Chrissy Whalen's bold and beautiful singing of Sara Bareilles' "Brave" fit in so perfectly (which is never a coincidence, of course) with the service. Some words from it:

...Nothing's gonna hurt you the way that words do

And they settle 'neath your skin

Kept on the inside and no sunlight

Sometimes a shadow wins

But I wonder what would happen if you

Say what you want to say

And let the words fall out

Honestly, I wanna see you be brave.

And since your history of silence

Won't do any good

Did you think it would?

Let your words be anything but empty

Why don't you tell them the truth?

Sherry Manetta (President-Elect, Term: 07.01.2017 – 06.30,2018) has been a member of USH for 6 years. She is currently a member of the Strategic Planning team, is active with the Welcome Volunteers, and is a regular volunteer at pancake breakfasts and picnics. In her nonprofit board service, she has focused on education and social justice, having served as board chair and chair of finance, audit, strategic planning and executive committees for various organizations over multiple decades in Chicago, New York and Hartford. The specific Board-affirmed goals for the 2017-2018 budget are to:



Denominational News

A Note from Rev. Heather: In news of our larger denomination, I need to share with you that the President of our Unitarian Universalist Association, Rev. Peter Morales, resigned this past week. There is a concise overview of recent events in this Washington Post article. However, in the wise words of Rev. Meg Riley. "The current crisis about racism in the UUA is not that someone resigned. It is that many precious people of color are poised at the edge of a precipice, trying to discern if the ground of Unitarian Universalism is safe to traverse or if they will hit exploding landmines and then be blamed for the explosions--trying to decide if they can stay Unitarian Universalist or need to go elsewhere. To my white UU friends [writes Meg], it's up to us to defuse... those landmines as we see them, knowing that we will never see them all and relying on the wisdom of people of color, who can identify them with much greater skill than we have." In the wise words of another colleague, Rev. Erika Hewitt: "[This] crisis has been unfolding quietly in our Unitarian Universalist Association for about two weeks: across the country, our faith leaders have been coming to grips with the painful reality of how racism (and sexism, and other -isms) have thwarted fair hiring practices in our Association, and -- more to the point -- how we as a faith devalue, discount, and push aside UUs of Color. This is their truth: it's not ours to assess, to "but...but-but," or to disclaim. It's a truth that demands white UUs to listen, to examine ourselves for how we perpetuate these patterns, and to atone." I'm available to talk with you more about it all if you'd like. In response to a call to all UU congregations to wrestle together with these issues and events, we as a congregation will be focusing our May 7 worship service on how white supremacy shows up in our own congregation, larger community, region, and denominational experiences. 

What this workshop is about: "People with disabilities frequently encounter language that robs them of their humanity. This workshop seeks to raise awareness and encourage more thoughtful language choices...There is no consensus across disabilities on a single standard for preferred language.
