Join Other UUs in Getting Out The Vote this Fall

With the upcoming November midterms, there are opportunities to resist the criminalization of our communities. Two key ballot initiatives—one in Ohio and one in Florida—will create justice in those states and strategically push forward this movement in other states as well. **Join the UUA [on the ground or phone banking](#) from where you are in support of leading edge legislation to reduce mass incarceration and restore voting rights in Ohio and Florida.** Voter suppression campaigns aimed at people of color, youth, and naturalized citizens are undermining our communities and our democracy. One federal court put it plainly, writing that a North Carolina voting law was an unconstitutional effort to "target African-Americans with almost surgical precision." To combat these shameful attacks, *Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice* and the *All Souls*

Church Reeb Project for Voting Rights have teamed up on a series of events this fall to increase voter participation in states including Virginia, North Carolina, and Florida. Americans of Conscience Checklist, Week of October 7, 2018

A milestone for us: 100 weeks ago, the Electoral College installed our current administration.

In the last 100 weeks, you've changed too. You've likely developed skills and knowledge you didn't have before. You are more informed than you were then--a better citizen, a better neighbor, and a better advocate for the issues that matter. As a result, our country will change for the better because of you and so many who are choosing to speak up for a more hopeful, more inclusive America.

Advocating for what's right--even when our elected officials don't listen--is an American value. Speaking up is part of *who we are*. Deep breaths, friends. Let's look to our neighbors, link arms, and do this together.

I value secure, convenient voting and fair elections. Democracy thrives when all citizens can freely elect those who represent their values.

For months, we've been advocating for safer, fairer elections, this month our sole priority is to show up for midterms. Let's do this!

Action 1: Check your state [registration deadline and ID requirements](#). 30 state deadlines are imminent.

Action 2: [Pledge to vote](#).

Action 3: [Vote early if you can](#). (Or [set up reminders](#).)

Action 4: Check today and weekly that your name isn't [purged from voter rolls](#).

Action 5: [Get a sample ballot \(email not required\)](#) to check out your candidates' records. Be sure to vet District Attorney candidates.

Action 6: Check that your polling place is [open and in the same place](#).

Action 7: Offer (or request) a ride to the polls on your social media accounts.

You never know who can't afford the extra gas or who feels unsafe voting alone.

I value showing respect for all people, no matter where they were born.

We oppose inhumane treatment of all people and the government agencies that perpetuate it. [People who immigrate to the US make our country stronger and are entitled to basic respect](#).

Action: Advocate for oversight of ICE facilities. Call: Your one House rep and two senators ([look up](#)). **Script:** Hi. I'm from [ZIP] and I'm calling with concerns about detained people in ICE facilities who are not receiving [adequate medical care](#). I would like [name] to demand investigation into reports showing a [failure to provide basic care](#) and [deaths in detention](#). What is [name] doing to hold ICE and DHS accountable?

Action: End corporate investment in US immigration detention.

Script: I'm [a Chase customer and] concerned about JPMorgan Chase's continued investment in the detention giants CoreCivic and Geo Group. These companies [ignore federal regulations](#), leading to abuse, neglect, and death for people in their facilities. I [stand with my immigrant neighbors](#) in opposing the practice of [profiting off victims](#), especially when xenophobic policies are [driving up](#) detention. I urge you to [cut financial ties](#) immediately to stop keeping these barbaric companies afloat. History will remember the decision you make. Thank you. *Name, address*

Events and Personal News of Our Community

Long-time USH member Tom Kemble died on September 29. His full obituary follows.



Obituary: Tom Kemble

On Saturday, September 29, 2018, Thomas Haynes Kemble died as he had lived – with integrity and on his own terms. He was at home, surrounded by family, and at 90 years old, still had all of his own teeth. Tom and his wife Joan moved to Madison, WI in 2011. His one request was, “Build me a home to die in.”

He passed many contented hours enjoying the view of the enormous backyard garden he and Joan created, and the tall black cherry trees that he considered to be sentient beings. Tom, Joan and their daughter,

Martha, lived together in the home built for them next door to their daughter, Rebecca, her husband, Adam, and grandchildren Ndegwa, Kibuna, and Hannah. All comers would agree that the family compound is characterized by a sense of solidarity and abundance of food, hospitality, comfort, and love. Tom and Joan carried this sensibility from their farm and bed & breakfast, Udderly Woolly Acres, in Glastonbury, CT. Growing food was Tom’s great joy. He was a pioneer organic farmer and stalwart member of the Northeast Organic

Farmers Association. He worked for decades to build the soil that would nurture his beloved corn and tomatoes and raised generations of cows, sheep, goats, pigs, geese, ducks, and chickens for the table.

Social justice was Tom's great passion. He raised his voice and his fist to advocate and agitate for single-payer, universal health-care, racial justice, abolishing the death penalty, voting rights, free speech, anti-imperialism, criminal justice reform, LGBTQ rights, peace, and other issues promoting people power.

Music was Tom's enduring spiritual practice. Playing the French Horn, singing, and basking in the performances of others connected him to the Universal Life Force. He played in The Madison Community Orchestra, and was a member of New Horizons Bands and UU Congregational Choirs in both Connecticut and Madison. He continued horn lessons until he entered the hospital. He was a frequent and enthusiastic singer at the longest-running musical protest in world history, The Solidarity Sing Along, held every weekday at noon at The Wisconsin State Capitol Rotunda.

Continuous learning was Tom's sustenance. Tom graduated from North HS in Des Moines, IA in 1945. He enlisted in the navy after high school, serving for two years before attending Drake University, where he ran cross-country and earned a bachelor's degree in history. After Drake he was recalled to serve in the Korean War. Upon his return, he went to The University of Iowa, where he met Joan. After trying out medical school and dabbling in psychology, he settled on electrical engineering, earning a second bachelor's degree. That was not sufficient. In the 1960's he earned two master's degrees from The University of Connecticut in electrical engineering and economics. He continued to pursue a PHD in economics in the 1970's, achieving ABD status. In the 1980's he became certified to teach chemistry, math, and physics in high schools. He was a life-long learner, devouring books and atlases through his final weeks, inspiring and cultivating a love of learning in his children and grandchildren.

Family was his foundation. He was one of five brothers and one sister who have been steadfastly connected, gathering for weeklong reunions every other year since 1961. The five brothers gathered often in recent years. Tom and Joan had four daughters and adopted a son. Tom was diligent about the upkeep of the birthdate list of his descendants. Tom was an active member of the Caucus of Connecticut Democrats. He served on the Glastonbury Democratic Town Committee and on many committees at The Unitarian Society of

Hartford. Throughout the 1960's and 70's Tom wrote, acted, and sang with great gusto in the annual political satire known as The Democratic Skit. His parents, William and Ruth Kemble; his sister, Mary Alice Kemble; his sisters-in-law Catherine, Joy and Mary Kemble; and his daughter Dr. Sarah Kemble precede him in death. His life continues to be celebrated by his brothers, Jim, John (Bernice), David (Barbara), and Peter; his wife Joan; his children, Martha Kemble, Jennifer Gitberg (Steve), and Rebecca Kemble (Adam Chern), Joshua, and son-in-law, Jerry Lund; grandchildren, Emily (Jill), Stephanie (William), Ndegwa, Dustin, Kenneth Kibuna, Katie, Corry, Carolyn, Jeremy, and Hannah; great-grandsons, Darrien, Cipriano, and Anders; and many nieces, nephews, and great-nieces and nephews.

The family cared for his body at home, and drove him to Natural Path Sanctuary at The Farley Center in Verona, WI for a green burial on Monday, October 1, 2018. A public memorial will be held on Sunday, November 18, 2018 at 3pm at the Warner Park Community Recreation Center. Donations in his name may be made to Natural Path Sanctuary, James Reeb UU Congregation, or Veterans For Peace – Clarence Kailin Chapter 25.


