**Remembering Our Ancestors** - This is the season when we humans have long observed the seasonal death of the green and grassy natural world surrounding us. We become more aware of birth, life and death, and with the sun's relentless excursion ever southward, remember those we have known who are no longer with us.

During the Sunday service on November 1st, Rayla reminded the children in comments and reading from a book that all living things begin, and end, and in the middle is the living. She noted death could come at any time, as it is the way with all living organisms, even insects.

Rev. Cathy, in her first reflection, captured the emotions of the congregation with the short few words about the little girl, who asked. "Where is Grandma? Is she in heaven? How do I get there?"



She pointed out, regardless of your beliefs about life after death, death itself is a profound change, and grief is universal. She further noted, in our society grief is given short shrift, and in her experience, there is value in allowing grief to melt away into tears. We should not grieve alone.

Our lost ones live on in us with their attributes both good and bad, and we have the power to select those attributes to carry forward.

The Sunday service was an opportunity to celebrate and honor the lives of those who have come and gone, those we have known, those we know of, and those unknown to us. We honored the memories of the following USH member who died in the last year or so: Bob Attenborough, Dorothy Fowler, Charlotte Harris, Barbara Hellenga, Janet Hill, Ruth Holland, Alice LaBel, Bill Rose, and Janice Williams. We stand upon the shoulders of all of them.

"Can you hear them, the whispers of the ancestors who call us into becoming?"

Learn the stories of those about you. As an example, Rev. Cathy noted the things she had learned about the remarkable USH member, Dorothy Fowler, while preparing for her recent memorial service. She said there is strength to be drawn from the story of the 20-year-old widow, Dorothy Fowler, learning to fly as part of the World War II effort. We are, she said, the continuation of these remarkable people. It matters that we learn their stories.

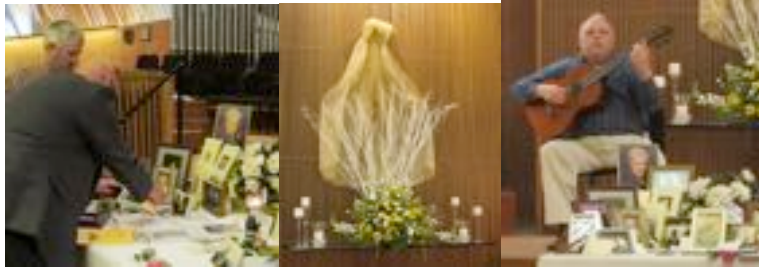


May we live lives others will honor after we are gone and cherish our lives between the beginning and the end.



As part of the service there were many pictures of loved ones placed on the altar, and during the candles of memory and hope Rev. Cathy urged participants to take their time as we collectively remembered those in the pictures, those honored by slips of paper carrying their names, and those in everyone's memory.

Sarah Puckett on piano, Roger Chapell on Guitar, and Ed Savage on the didgeridoo added their remarkable talents to a service attended by 138 of us.



**A Reflection from the Revs--  
Dear members & friends of USH,**

We want to acknowledge and appreciate all of you who participated so heartfully in the service series we put together on anticipating our own dying ("While There Is Still Light," October 25, 2015, and "Remembering Our Ancestors," November 1, 2015). We received comments from many that you appreciated the 2-part series, the two different angles on death, dying, remembering, and grief, and the opportunity to reflect on your own thoughts, fears, losses, and memories.

In the midst of those services, a colleague of our's, the Rev. Mark Stringer, who serves a congregation in Des Moines, Iowa, posted the following, and gave us permission to share this with you. It is something else to consider along these lines of acknowledging and anticipating our own dying and contemplating how we would like to experience that inevitable journey.

"From the earliest days of my ministry, as I presided at memorial services, when I would hear friends and family share touching remembrances, I would feel sadness well up in me that these things were not said in the person's presence. I wondered what it would be like to hold a service \*before\* someone with terminal illness died. A few years ago, a member who was well-known in the congregation was told she only had a few weeks to live. I asked her if she would be willing to be celebrated in a "living memorial" service. She agreed. On the chosen night, people came to the church unsure of what to expect. Frankly, I was, too. It turned out to be a beautiful night of meaning and storytelling and sweetness. Since then, I've presided over two more "living memorial" services, including one last night. The format is simple. Early in the service, everyone is given a minute or two to write on index cards a response to the following prompt, "When I think of [the person being celebrated]...", a song is played as the cards are collected. Then a few prepared reflections and written remembrances (from those not present) are shared. Another song of importance to the person is played. 3-4 people then read the index cards as a "community poem". Then the floor is opened for storytelling and sharing before the service closes. With a few hymns and maybe a reading and prayer or two, the service takes about 60-90 minutes. In my 14+ years of ministry, I've seen few things more powerful than these services. I share all of this with you not to suggest that I, and the congregation I serve, have been innovators with these services. I'd expect that others have probably done something similar from time to time. I share this to give courage and confidence to those who might want to try it themselves. Do it, I tell you. You'll be glad you did." --**Rev. Mark Stringer**

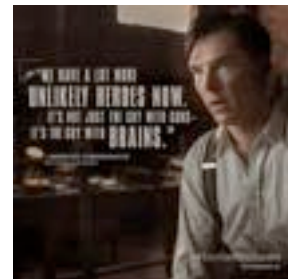

New York City recognized the participation gap and established their first LGBT Senior Center in 2012. We are not NYC, but we want to create the same type of opportunity in Connecticut with the "LGBT Moveable Senior Center."

The LGBT Moveable Senior Center is a pilot partnership among five Senior Centers in the Greater Hartford area - Avon, Bloomfield, Canton, Newington, and Simsbury. Next year we anticipate additional centers joining in. Plainville and West Hartford are interested as well. Each month, a Center will host the "LGBT Moveable Senior Center" day of programming. Over the course of some 5 hours we will have a meal, entertainment, choices of programs or activities, and provide information and services.

The programs will be different at each Center but will follow a similar format organized around the Senior Center theme of "mind, body and spirit." We have assembled an Advisory Committee of LGBT community members and Allies to provide input and help with outreach. Some of the programming choices will be offered by members of the LGBT community.
