Sunday, November 8th Recap by Kayla Costenoble

Dwell in Possibility - During her sermon on November 8, 2015, Rev. Heather asked a question whose answer requires some deep thought: “What were you searching for when you first sought out this congregation?”

Her remarks during the service suggested but-we’ve-always-done- it-this-way is not necessarily the best way to go. She reminded us that in a short distance of 15 miles, there are three Unitarian congregations—Fern Street in West Hartford, UU Society: East in Manchester, and our USH in Hartford—plus the UU Church in Meriden not that far away.

We do collaborate with one another in such areas as music and marches and important celebrations, but there is an undertone of “Why don’t we do more together?” What happens between the times we get together, and what are some alternatives for us?

Rev. Heather believes it is “meaningful and worthwhile” to have these three options, and her opinion is certainly shared by others. New England has the highest density of UU congregations—there are 44 congregations within 15 miles in the Boston area. During

the short but “pivotal time” she lived in Pennsylvania, Rev. Heather said it mattered to her that she had three UU congregations to choose from; the smallest one was right for her at that time.



Early in the service, we watched “The Sanctuary,” a video presentation described as a story of collaboration, shown on a large screen on the Chancel, and a dream, perhaps, of what might be possible for UU congregations in the Greater Hartford area. The First Church of Boston and the First Church of Cambridge co-host a worship together once a month. Seekers of all kinds gather in homes and small groups (usually not on Sundays) to connect with others in non-traditional settings and worship. In the video, many (mostly young) persons told their stories and spoke of the love and spirit they felt as they gathered in a like-minded community of people.

Rev. Heather said, “The health of each of us affects the health of all of us,” and spoke of a workshop led by Rev. Sue Phillips during the June 2015 General Assembly. Rev. Phillips heads the UUA’s New England Regional staff. The workshop was designed to lay the “groundwork for a movement-wide re-covenanting process that could reunite the community of UU congregations.”

Rev. Phillips said the heyday of consistent churchgoing is over and we are entering a new area. But it is not possible to be a UU alone; it must be practiced in covenanted community. “If UUism is to survive, we need to counter individualism and division,” she said. Autonomy and interconnection can cohabit comfortably; they are connected by a web, not a rope. She described “covenant” as both a noun and a verb, meaning commitment, content and maintenance.



“Today is a day for dreaming...from the mundane to the wild and crazy,” Rev. Heather said, and asked what might be possible in the years ahead. She said UU congregations, through live streaming and skype, are already reaching out to prisons, colleges, military bases and senior centers. Here in our Greater Hartford family, for example, we might take heritage trips to Boston and New Orleans, have intern ministers serve more than one church, join in outreach efforts, and

connect beyond congregational identities.

Members of the USH Youth Group did their annual sleep out in boxes Saturday night to get a hint of what it might feel like to be a homeless person. Sunday’s Offering will go to My Sisters’ Place, a shelter the Youth Group continues to support with their wonderful soup-making.



The lines of persons waiting to light a Candle of Memory and Hope keep getting longer and longer. So, on this Sunday, there were four stations, for the first time. I am always impressed when things are changed for the better.

I also enjoy hearing examples from our ministers' personal experiences. Rev. Heather, searching for something that would allow three-year old Robin to be the right height for sitting at the table, remembered she had a telephone book (kept for sentimental reasons) alongside her cookbooks. Robin, not surprisingly in today's world, had no idea what a telephone book was, but announced, "Phone books and cookbooks are not for sitting on." Some of today's words that Robin does know, Rev. Heather said, include text, facebook, touch screen, church member, friend, party together, and help me, please.

Matthew Primm, who served at the USH as composer-in-residence two years ago, composed and first presented his "The Principles" here one Sunday. This past Sunday, pianist Sarah Puckett and the USH Choir presented the melodic and rhythmic seventh movement, "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." Finally, the fourth verse of what has become our Gathering Song, says it all in just a few words:

Don't be afraid of some change,
 Don't be afraid of some change,
 Today will be a joyful day,
 Enter, rejoice, and come in.



Syrian Refugee Resettlement Help

A number of us at the Unitarian Society have been exploring what the congregation might do to help the large numbers of refugees from Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan and a number of African countries in resettling here.



We have contacted refugee resettlement agencies in New Haven and Hartford who have experience and support resources. We are identifying other congregations in the Hartford area with whom we might partner.

To resettle a family a number of support items are required (e.g.): rent for 4-6 months, furnishing the apartment with donated goods, help in obtaining employment, help to learn English, settling children in schools, getting health care, driving to appointments, acclimating to the area, government paperwork, etc.

How much of this we might undertake as a congregation alone or with others, or as individuals is to be determined.

We are now seeking to enlist other interested church members in this exploration. Please contact Mike Winterfield, Richard Groothuis, or Vanessa Gonzales Rivera, if you are interested in aiding in this effort.

GREAT DISCUSSION - SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 15 AT 9 AM IN SERVETUS ROOM. - Paula Jones and Kevin Gough will be leading our discussion on **JUSTICE** – Some Points from "The Collapse of American Criminal Justice" by William J. Stuntz

We're moving through the book for the HAC discussion on Nov. 21 - very interesting book because it tries to get at root causes. The points we'd like to throw out to start a discussion:

- Retributive vs. deterrent justice: retributive justice inevitably produces discriminatory justice in a system plagued by law enforcement budget constraints.
- Failure of the American Constitution - its focus is procedural, not substantive.
- Local control of the justice system: "Twice in American history [the designation of criminal enforcement to the states] has been disrupted. Prohibition was the second time. Reconstruction was the first." (We should also talk about the Prohibition example - some of what I 'knew' was definitely wrong.)

Here's the blurb from the frontispiece --

The rule of law has vanished in America's criminal justice system. Prosecutors now decide whom to punish and how severely. Almost no one accused of a crime will ever face a jury. Inconsistent policing, rampant plea bargaining, over-crowded courtrooms, and ever more draconian sentencing have produced a gigantic prison population, with black citizens the primary defendants and victims of crime. In this passionately argued book, the leading criminal law scholar of his generation looks to history for the roots of these problems - and for their solutions.

Digging into [the history and structure of American crimes] and the strategies that attempted to control them, Stuntz reveals the costs of abandoning local democratic

control...[and centralizing the system], with state legislators and federal judges given increasing power. You can follow up with the Hartford Area Humanists on Nov 21 – go to Meetup.com to get more on the time and place.
