January 3, 2016, Sunday Service Recap, by Kayla Costenoble

Wisdom of Centenarians - “May songs, love, poetry and mystery continue to fill our lives,” Rev. Heather said in concluding her moving service on aging at the USH on January 3, 2016. She urged us to “create more of that which brings you joy” and helps “mend the fabric of our frayed world.”

Member Betty Arnold, who reached 100 years on December 30, was honored at the service. With her son, she lit the chalice, listened to the congregation sing Happy Birthday to her, collected birthday cards and shared a couple of birthday cakes with us (one of which was gluten free, to be p.c.) in Fellowship Hall after the service.

Rev. Heather visited Betty in her Wethersfield home in December and said it “was clear to me” that Betty’s mantra for longevity was “Why worry if you can do nothing about it? Take one day at a time.” In an oral history done by Betty and the late Dorothy Fowler in December 1988, Betty said she started going to the UU church on Pearl Street when she was 11, and she has been coming to the various churches the USH has inhabited ever since. Among many other things, she was on the search committee that chose Nat Lauriat as minister.

During her time with the kids, Rayla asked them if they “knew anyone like our Betty Arnold, who is 100?” They didn’t. She told them she has several family members who are. Her great aunt attributes her long life to “ginger cookies and Gatorade,” and told Rayla that as long as she is living, she should be learning.

How long we will live is “the great mystery and universal reality we struggle with daily,” Rev. Heather said. Our co-ministers are young (half the age of many of us); they often share the words and ideas of older (and not so old) writers, poets and composers with us. Farmer poet Wendell Berry, who is often quoted at the Meeting House, wrote “...the longer we are together, The longer death grows around us... We have the sweetness of ripening.”

Not very many of us, when asked by Rev. Heather, were familiar with the third album released by British singer-songwriter Adele in November; it was number one in the first week of 2016. Titled “25,” its songs, it has been said, show the melancholy of the 25-year old singer about the passage of time and her yearning for her old self (We know the feeling). Here are some lines from “Million Years Ago.”

I wish I could live a little more
 Look up to the sky, not to the floor
 I feel my life is flashing by

And all I can do is watch and cry
 I miss the air, I miss my friends
 I miss my mother, I miss it when
 Life was a party to be thrown
 But that was a million years ago.

We were given an oral tour through Jerry Friedman’s 2005 book, “Earth’s Elders: The Wisdom of the World’s Oldest People.” He spent four years traveling the world to interview people 110 years and older; they are described as “super centenarians.” Here are a few of the things they said were important: a sense of resilience; everything in moderation; sing every day to increase lung capacity and brain power and reduce snoring; be careful in choosing your parents; adhere to a steadfast work ethic; appreciate the washing machine; begin each day as if you were expecting a guest. - **Kayla Costenoble**

December 27, 2015, Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble - The Beatles: Their Genius, Their Love, and Their Influence. - What a wonderful change of sound—from “Jingle Bells” to All You Need is Love—as we celebrated what Worship Associate Sue Smolski called a “between Sunday” service on December 27, 2015.

Pulpit Guest Rev. Douglas Wilson, who has spoken at the USH before, led us on a meandering musical history tour of what happened after the Beatles made their live television performance in the U.S. on the February 9, 1964, Ed Sullivan show. Rev. Wilson retired in 2012, after almost 30 years at Rowe Camp. During those years, he started the Rowe Conference Center in the fall, winter and spring, which becomes Rowe Camp in the summer.

All the music during the service was by the Beatles. Our gathering song, sung with gusto, was *I Want to Hold Your Hand*. Rev. Wilson's opening words were from their *Within You Without You*:

We were talking about the love we all could share
 When we find it, to try our best to hold it there with our love
 With our love, we could save the world, if they only knew...
 Try to realize it's all within yourself
 No one else can make you change

Rev. Wilson was in high school in 1963, when President Kennedy was murdered. In that same year, *I Want to Hold Your Hand* became the Beatles' first number one hit and Beatle-mania began. In 1965, all top five songs were Beatle songs. In college, Rev. Wilson went to Denver for a national fraternity meeting. The Beatles were staying at the same hotel and he watched a riot where 5000 mostly girls age 11-17 surrounded and overwhelmed a limo they thought the fab four were in. The Beatles escaped in a plain car. And who can forget Ringo's answer to "How do you find America?"—"Turn left at Greenland."

Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band, the Beatles' eighth album, was recorded and released on June 1, 1967. Scholars have called it the closest western civilization has come to unity. It spent 15 weeks as the number one album in the U.S. A "New Yorker" writer wrote that to get "really really good at something," you have to practice it 10,000 hours. He wrote that the Beatles knew how to make music, harmonize, sing on pitch, and showed a blossoming creativity. Others who rhapsodized over the Beatles included Leonard Bernstein, Bob Dylan, and Frank Sinatra, who called *Something in the Way She Moves* the greatest love story in 50 years.

During Sunday's service we also sang **Strawberry Fields Forever** and listened with delight to "our" pianist Pi-Shun Shih play *Norwegian Wood*, **In My Life** and **Here Comes the Sun** for the Prelude, **Yesterday** during the offering, and a rousing, applaud-generating **All You Need is Love** for the Postlude.

Special note: A collection of 55 black and white photographs (out of the 3000 he took) of the Beatles taken by "Life" magazine's Bill Eppridge during the Beatles' 1964 visit to New York will be shown at Western Connecticut State University from January 19 through March 13. - **Kayla Costenoble**



UPDATE ON CHANGING ROLE AT USH FOR BRIAN MULLEN

Thank you for your support this past year with my transition to reduced working hours at USH. It's been a wonderful experience for me and I believe a beneficial situation for USH as well.

As was mentioned in some E-News submissions this past September, the marketing firm (gem-advertising.com) I have been working with (when I'm not at the Meeting House) has been growing by leaps and bounds. I'm finding that the best options for my future lay with putting more of my work time with this firm and thus reducing my presence with USH.

Since October 1, 2015, I have been working 16 hours per week at USH (full days Tuesday & Thursday). Beginning January 1, 2016, in my new role as USH Bookkeeper, most weeks I will average somewhere between 8 and 12 hours per week. I will hold 2 consistent weekly office hours through March 2016, and will perform all my other tasks as needed as time is available to me in the evenings, weekends, at home or at the Meetinghouse. I will of course continue to be available via email.

Status of the USH Archives - With the recent passing of Margaret Sax, I think it will benefit many in knowing the hard work she performed in the USH Archives will not be forgotten.
