As we kick off a new congregational year, we are so excited to announce that Thirty Days of Love, this time dedicated to intersectional racial justice, is back for 2016! Thirty Days is an exciting opportunity to support the emerging and ongoing racial justice organizing happening in Unitarian Universalist congregations across the country, in the tradition of organizing for civil and human rights and in support of the growing Movement for Black Lives.

After a brief hiatus this year to allow room for the newly launched Climate Justice Month, Thirty Days returned Saturday, January 16 and continues through Sunday, February 14, 2016.

In 2016, we are centering on racial justice as it intersects with other core justice priorities of the UUA, such as immigration justice and LGBTQ equity. We are featuring multi-generational and family resources as in years' past, and will offer congregational resources for each week.

Back in 2012, the team at Standing on the Side of Love realized there were exactly 30 days in between Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Valentine's Day. We had already been re-imagining Valentine's Day as a social justice holiday for a few years, so we thought we'd get creative and make something meaningful happen in between these two powerful holidays. From that Thirty Days of Love was created!

In subsequent years, it hasn't been an exact 30 days between these two holidays, but the dates still provide an important anchor to the start and close of our initiative.

So, what are the goals for Thirty Days of Love? Why is it important and why should we participate?

Thirty Days of Love brings tools for individuals and congregations to engage in listening campaigns, expanded partnership and collaboration, theological

reflection, collective sharing, political education, and support for direct action.

We offer tangible resources for you to celebrate the words and deeds of unsung heroes and to continue the effort to promote equality, acceptance, diversity, and inclusion.

Thirty Days of Love has been a phenomenal experience for lots of folks and we consider this year no different. This year, we'll send one weekly email on specific justice issues as they relate to racial justice, and offer you resources for reflection, education and action. There will also be a daily message or action shared via social media so follow along on Facebook and Twitter to see those messages.

In years past, we have heard the powerful voices of justice leaders both within Unitarian Universalism as well from many of our partner organizations who are on the frontlines of organizing for racial justice. We expect this year to be no different. Take your involvement to the next level by signing up to participate in Share the Love Sunday, giving a Courageous Love Award, and collaborating and organizing with local Black Lives Matter organizations to take action for racial justice in your own community.

### **February 7, 2016 Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble**

**Being a New Englander** - "Welcome on this radiant New England morning," Rev. Heather greeted us on February 7, 2016. It was a great choice of words for a sunny Sunday that reached 50 degrees. But this came after a heavy rain, a cold, windy, snowy Friday, a milder Saturday, and the "promise" of more snow this coming Monday and Tuesday, with a high on Monday struggling to reach 30

degrees. I couldn't help but think of our Mark Twain's oft-repeated, "If you don't like the weather in New England now, just wait a few minutes."

Our minister, a native Oregonian, did a lot of homework for her sermon, probably ending up knowing as much or more about New England that we who've lived here for some time do. She began her sermon with two true stories illustrating those heralded New England characteristics/stereotypes: self reliant, independent, hardy, resourceful, flinty, taciturn, not always friendly, hard-working.

"The Human Shingle" featured a man whose wife woke him from a nap to climb on to his roof (as he had done many times before) on January 29, 1907, to fix some holes in the shingles. The view was spectacular, the sun was shining (sound familiar?), and he happily fell asleep as he lay on his back on the roof. Hours later, the 20 degree cold woke him, his body ached, and he was frozen to the roof. He had also lost his voice and could not call for help. His son eventually pried him off the shingles; he nearly died, but recovered and resumed his chores within a week. Hardy, etc.

Story number two concerns a French Canadian Italian family who arrived in Hartford in 1920. The father in this arranged marriage opened a shoemaker shop at the corner of Homestead and Garden Streets. One of his five daughters was Ann Uccello, elected in 1967 and again in 1969 as the first female mayor of the city of Hartford and the state of Connecticut. During the riots following Martin Luther King, Jr.'s assassination in 1968, she helped ease the pain and confusion by spending the night in the streets with Hartford residents. So let's add "brave" and "courageous" to our list of New England traits. Mayor Ann, as she was called, is now in her 90's.

Rev. Heather also told us about the late poet Maxine Kumin (1925-2014) who won the Pulitzer prize in 1973 for "Up Country: Poems of New England" and won the 2006 Frost Medal in 2006. When she was a young poet she attended the annual Bread Loaf Writers' Conference at Middlebury College in Vermont, and literally sat at the feet of Robert Frost as he gave a "savage reading" and harangued the would-be poets, as she recalls the event in her "The Final Poem," to:

Look up from the page. Pause between poems.  
 Say something about the next one.  
 Otherwise the audience  
 will coast, they can't take in  
 half of what you're giving them.  
 Reaching for the knob of his cane  
 he rose, and flung this exit line:  
 Make every poem your final poem.

Much, of course, can be inferred from that final line of Frost's advice to poets and Kumin's use of it in her poem. It speaks of life, aging (Frost was old and not well), death and acceptance of one's own mortality. Rev. Heather reminded us that we all live finite lives, that we are here just temporarily, and that we are all searching for meaning in our lives.

We are not lacking in stories, Rev. Heather said, but the question is what to do with this history? How can we move forward to the future? Our challenge in New England is to move towards the future without entrenchment in our history. We must "focus on who we are now, in the present moment, without needing to give elaborate history lessons." What do we want our footprint to be as New Englanders and as Unitarians?

Our always-wonderful music was enhanced by the addition of Rev. Cathy, cello and Ginny Allen, violin, as they joined the USH Choir in a moving rendition of "The Snow" (music by Edward Elgar, poem by his wife Alice Elgar). They also enriched our closing hymn "Blue Boat Home."

Peter Meny, chair of this year's Stewardship Committee, told us that February was a "month of thanks" and a time to be grateful that we are partners with the USH. We will be hearing three "inspiring and moving" pulpit testimonials from some of our newest members. Pledge Sunday on March 20 will feature one of our famous traditional pancake breakfasts followed by our traditional pledging during the service as we "build the foundation for another great year at the Meeting House." sign checks. Working with the Finance Committee, the Business Manager and the Board, they also coordinate the development of the annual church budget.

The Treasurer and President -Elect are Board Officers and meet with the Ministers and the President and Secretary during the week prior to the monthly Board meeting to plan the agenda and discuss other board and church issues.


Council Chairs serve for two years supporting and coordinating the work of the sub-councils and committees they're responsible for.



Shames' novel is set in a Texas country town and peopled by folks named Lurleen and Marybeth and an aging lawman with a cane for his bad knee, who calls a murder scene "a dreadful sight." But know that you're not getting a sampling of the wisdom of simple souls. This is a perceptive look, written with style and tight discipline, into a hermetic society in which everything—a night out gone bad, a high-school football game—assumes colossal proportions. Jack Harbin is a blind, one-legged Vietnam vet brutally murdered for no apparent reason. It's for Samuel Craddock, a retired lawman pressed into service because the current police chief is a boozer, to limp around asking questions until the truth comes out. The details are mundane, going from disability checks to bottles of cold medicine, and for all the interlocking small-town dramas, the solution to the mystery hinges on the sudden appearance of two out-of-towners. They look different. They don't belong. Getting involved with outsiders was the killer's major mistake. A gritty take on small-town crime. --Don Crinklaw

### Update on the USH Archives

Our last Archives meeting was held on Jan. 13 with Rev. Heather, Larry Lunden, Kayla Costenoble, and myself present. We revisited our most pressing issues with the condition of some of the unboxed archival materials (architectural drawings and some scrapbooks) and planned two upcoming dates to re-inventory the collection. This meeting was productive as we discussed the possibility of creating a record retention schedule for the entire congregation (i.e. what records we must keep and for how long as well as determining what to do with said documents at the end of their business use) as well as looking into purchasing a thermometer-hygrometer to track the temperature and humidity in the Margaret Fuller room.

Archival boxes were purchased to store records from Rev. Kathy Lee, Rev. Dave, as well as a box to keep for documents from Revs. Cathy & Heather. A list was created of the necessary acid-free storage tubes to buy for the architectural drawings recently donated to USH from Roy Cook; the nature of blueprint paper is either a thicker wax paper, or that of thin onionskin, the latter being very very fragile. Moving into the Spring, our group hopes to meet at least monthly to work at the arrangement and description of the archives and to build upon the Inventory of the Archives Margaret Sax created in 1997. We hope to bring a synthesis to records created in the church office, paired with what we currently have in the Margaret Fuller Room to what may be lingering in members' basements or attics to bring the history of USH to the present. Over time, we hope to incorporate all the archival materials (including many formats of audio-visual materials) to make them accessible to all so we can freely share our story. Would you like to join us in this endeavor? We are next meeting on Feb. 10 at 10 for general processing and then from 10-2 on February 24 to begin to inventory the collection.
