March 20, 2016 Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble

Keep on Movin' Forward -- Subtitle: Welcome Sweet Springtime, We Greet Thee With Snow - "Contemplate what you want to be for," Rev. Heather urged us during our annual Pledge Sunday, March 20, 2016. It was a cold, sunny, wintry day, during which a great number of great things were going on. Her opening words welcomed us to chaos, abundance, irony (first day of spring snow), complexity, courage (to step forward into the unknown of the USH), perseverance, determination, and GENEROSITY. Worship Associate Lisa Galinski promised us a "fun, rousing, amazing service," which it was.

Pre-service, we feasted on the Stewardship Committee's free breakfast of pancakes (plain, chocolate chip, blueberry, gluten-free), eggs (real or fake), bacon (real or turkey), fruit and/or syrup, and, in case you were still hungry, oatmeal. And listened to Stewardship Committee Chair, Peter Meny, suggesting we eat a lot and give a lot.

With all the grief, pain and sadness around us, "Now, more than ever, we need a sanctuary," Rev. Heather said. It is our responsibility to be part of the ongoing stream of humanity. During our Turning Inward time, we read Responsive Reading 461:

Nothing worth doing is completed in our lifetime;

Therefore, we are saved by hope...

Nothing we do, however virtuous, can be accomplished alone;

Therefore, we are saved by love... Rev. Heather then sang "Keep on Moving Forward," the title of today's service and the theme of this year's Pledge Drive: "Gonna keep on moving forward, Never turning back."

Real-life experiences often serve as metaphors for our ministers; I love it. Last weekend, Revs. Heather and Cathy, plus Robin, were driving home from Monson, MA. Robin, not the best long-distance traveler, likes/needs frequent stops. One was at a tennis court converted into a skate park where Robin discovered the half-pipe. This contraption requires you to step back, get a running start, and believe you're going to get to the top. Robin was not eager to listen to her mother's advice on how to achieve this. And Rev. Heather reminded

us, again, nothing worth doing is completed in our lifetime. “We have a desperate need for evidence of goodness...justice, healing, and honest respect for dialog.”

Rev. Heather presented some USH facts we might not have been aware of. Fifty new members have joined in the past few years, giving us a total of 192 current members. There are 50 youth in the Religious Education program. We have installed 132 solar heating panels; each will be contributing 270 watts of energy. We have 17 part-time employees taking care of us; one goal of a successful Pledge Drive is to get them up to \$15/hour. Walking 20 times around the sanctuary = one mile.

Although our current membership is big enough that we can be actively engaged, Rev. Heather said, we are still running up the side of that ramp. Staying where we are, without some additional push, actually means we are falling backwards. We need to redouble our efforts. Then we opened and filled out our pledge cards and placed them in the large blue bowl, which is used for so many important events, at the foot of the chancel.

Sunday was the last day at USH for Sarah Puckett, our very talented piano Acting Accompanist. And it was a great last day. She played two unusual, for us, pieces by Henry Cowell, one of the first experimental piano composers. There’s always something new and different from our music department—thank goodness. Sarah also accompanied the Choir, and us, as we romped through some special music for Pledge Sunday, including the Beatles’ “Obla di Obla Da” with appropriate lyrics for Pledge Sunday written by our own Tina Davies. Sarah’s last act on Sunday was accompanying the classical music singers following the service, including her own solo performance. Good luck, Sarah, we’ll miss you.





Did you know? - A note from Rev. Cathy

There's so much happening at USH, that even we, your ministers, don't know all of it. It's truly wonderful! Here are two pieces of news that you may not know.

The good news:

The Ministers' Discretionary Fund is a special fund that the ministers use to support congregants in need, as well as special projects as they come up. In recent months, the fund has been used to pay for therapy for a member with depression, for pizza for volunteers & those arrested in the Moral Monday action in the fall, for food for a family in need, scholarships for the Women's Alliance retreat, and more.

If you find yourself struggling to pay an important bill, put food on the table, or tend to your mental health, or wishing you could attend a USH event but lack the funds, please know that this fund is for you and do contact Revs. Cathy or Heather. The fund is separate from our operating budget, and only the ministers will know of your request.

We will receive a special offering to support the Ministers' Discretionary Fund this Sunday, 3/27. Thanks to you all for your support of USH and one another!

The bad news:

Our Black Lives Matter lawn signs are regularly stolen from our lawn. We've lost count, but it's at least 7 times in the last few months. Our solar sign and other signs have never once been stolen, so clearly the message of "Black Lives Matter" is prompting this action. I ask you to consider what would lead someone to steal our signs? What changes do we need in the world so that the signs are not stolen and Black lives are respected? What is your piece of that work?

If you see the signs missing, please let Rev. Cathy know, and please do put up new ones!

RE at USH: Is it COOL? Or is it “WAY COOL”

Last Friday night, March 18th, Fellowship Hall became the site of meeting, eating, reading, and sharing for the new RE sub-council (committee) along with a variety of children, Rayla (our DRE), Rev. Cathy, and Martha Bradley (Chair of Spiritual Life).

First, we did some reading and then shared what sparked and excited us about what we'd read:

* Our curriculum from age 3-12 is based on our UU Principles and Purposes... The value of this is providing the firmest of foundations in our values. From age 12-20 the focus is on other religions.

We like the concept of the “Way Cool” approach which embodies differing formats: worship, classroom outreach, and arts.

To begin this journey, Rayla shared next year each age group will have connections to the community in the form of a Service Project linked to Social Justice.

* We learned that our vision is that we want more for our children than just a place to put them during Sunday services. It takes fully 25% of the congregation to be actively involved to make “experiential religious exploration happen.”...that “Either the entire congregation owns the educational ministry of the church or it is simply a euphemism for babysitting.”

The emphasis here is not on the place, a “village” but participation as a “villager” (all adults not solely parents) taking greater responsibility for the spiritual lives of our children in the 21st century. This means a 24/ 7 approach: i.e., reading, discussing, lighting a chalice at home, spending time in prayer and or meditation as a family, talking about good deeds outweighing gossip when it comes to neighbors...spending a portion of a Sunday morning in a religious exploration classroom or activity... This way we become more of a “neighborhood”.

* Our verdict is that by taking Sunday school out of the “traditional ‘box’ and creating Way Cool Sunday School, we experience new kinds of growth ...diversity in all its facets, programmatic growth with all its headaches and

opportunities, and most importantly, spiritual growth.” - Submitted by Diana Heymann

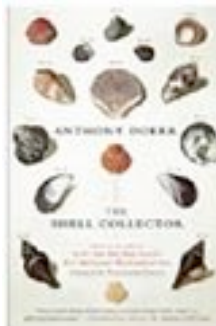

THE SHELL COLLECTOR: STORIES by Anthony Doerr The "perilously beautiful" (Boston Globe) first story collection by the author of the acclaimed Pulitzer Prize-winning #1 New York Times bestseller All The Light We Cannot See. The exquisitely crafted stories in Anthony Doerr's debut collection take readers from the

The Future of Kurdistan – Jean and Richard Groothuis, Discussants

Malawi: Lupembe Health Centre in Karonga Faces Electricity Crisis By Bishop Witmos

Karonga — Pregnant women at Lupembe Health Centre in the area of Traditional Authority (T/A) Kyungu in Karonga have been delivering in darkness during night hours for the past two months because Karonga District Hospital did not buy electric units for the health facility.

Chairperson for Lupembe Area Development Committee (ADC), Vincent Kayuni, disclosed this in an interview recently, saying the development resulted into use of torches by nurses to make sure the pregnant women delivered in light.

"It is very unfortunate to note that patients at Lupembe Health Centre are failing to access treatment just because of electricity units that cost less than K10 thousand per month, and as a community, we are worried because this might lead to deaths.

"I am not convinced on why the district hospital is currently failing to provide the units while it is receiving funding," worried Kayuni.

He said the health facility received units for February from the parent hospital following an effort by a Member of Parliament (MP) for the area, Frank Mwenifumbo.

However, a visit to the health facility Friday showed that it continues to face electricity challenges as it was unable to provide immunization vaccine for diseases such as Tetanus, Polio, and whooping cough to children and pregnant women because it cannot refrigerate the vaccine day in and day out.

I still have some items left to sell, or can receive and pass on your donations directly. Please talk with me this Sunday."

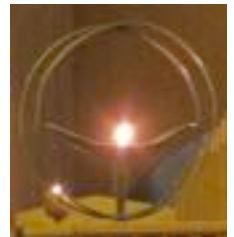
Update on the USH Archives by Zac Mirecki
