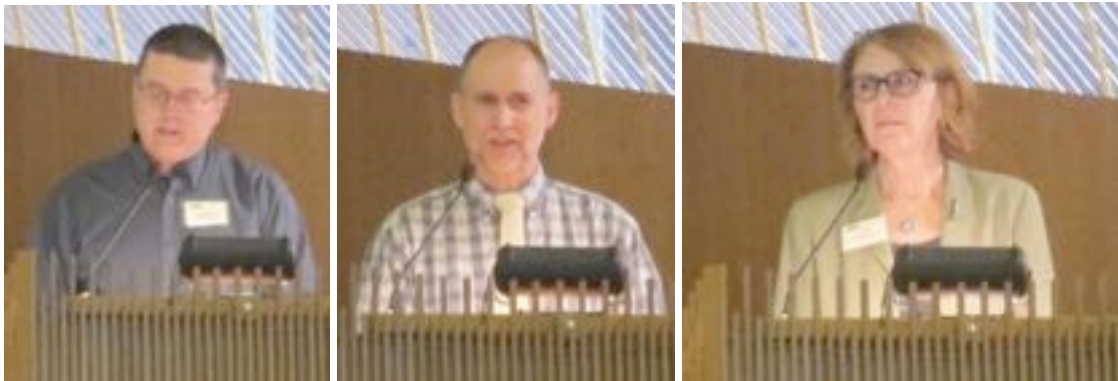

Sunday Service Recap, Sunday, April 24th, 2016 by Kayla Costenoble

“Saving...Each Other” -

Earth Day, Passover, spring warmth, blooming flowers and trees, and some sober words about climate change—all were part of the April 24, 2016, service at the USH. It was a time to fill one’s head and heart.

“I genuinely wish I had an uplifting message for you today,” were the words Rev. Heather used to begin her Reflection on this Earth Day, a global day of reckoning that began in 1970. A recent study, she said, showed that the impact of climate change on the world by 2100 is likely to be much worse than previously thought, and dislocation and migration will become the only options. New York, Rio De Janeiro, London and Shanghai will be the cities most vulnerable to severe flooding by 2100.

She cannot keep thinking about events all over the globe that show we are experimenting with life, Rev. Heather said. These include the tsunami and earthquake in 2011; Katrina in 2015; the extreme droughts exacerbated by climate change in 2006-2011 that displaced two million Syrians and “is likely to play out in other parts of the world.”

When she lived in Bend, Oregon, she gave a similar sermon, she said, as she saw that the residents could no longer produce their own food because of the short growing season; they had become dependent on gas-using trucks. “We are enormous consumers of the planet’s resources,” she said.

“What will this mean for the future?” Rev. Heather asked and said the increased fossil fuel use will affect oceans, ice packs and the atmosphere. “What will be our next steps?” Her answer? “We can look around and build more resilient connections with one another. We can imagine ourselves in advance of catastrophe and be a haven for one another.” There are ways we can cultivate healing and trust, she suggested. We need more “soul-expanding collective experiences” such as the solar panels for the Meeting House. She mentioned the grace gained in the action of walking through the path of a labyrinth and suggested we work on one for the USH. She suggested a neighborhood car-pooling system, and a greenhouse for worship programs. Rev. Heather recognized that “all the thinking and thinking can be so paralyzing” but waiting for an obvious solution or leader is not the answer and is not going to happen. Although it may be a slow and painful process, “We can still choose how we are going to be and who we are going to be with.”

Some amazing readings added much to the service. The USH’s Green Sanctuary Co-chairs, Mary Sherwin and Jeff Howard did their part. Mary read Jan Richardson’s “Blessing When the World is Ending.” Some words from it:

Look, the world is always ending somewhere...

It (this blessing) will simply sit

itself beside you among the shards

and gently turn your face toward the direction from

which the light will come, gathering itself

about you as the world begins again.

Jeff read Stephen M. Shick’s “Vanishing Song Birds.” Some words from it:

The winds of extinction sing a mournful song

in the rustling grass,

where the bobwhite drum

and the meadowlark’s melody is vanishing...

The wings of extinction sing a mournful song

while we wait to find our voices

to sing for their rebirth.

Rev. Heather read Rev. Victoria Safford’s meditation on the Jews migrating from Egypt and following Moses in a time of hardship and transition. A few words: “In

the springtime we remember: the promised land is not a destination—it is a way of going...It is planted in your mind and heart already, before you ever start out...What you need to do is stand up and walk forward.”

John Humphries, organizer of an unusual cooperative partnership of labor, religious and environmental communities started in 2012—The CT Roundtable on Climate and Jobs—spoke to us about how this diverse group engages in constructive dialog to shape energy and climate policies, and its “unexpected voices get noticed.” It aims to advocate for “public policies that address urgent concerns about climate change while creating good-paying jobs right here in our state.” Today’s Good Neighbor Offering will benefit this organization.

I realize each week how lucky I am to be able to hear three magnificent pieces played by pianist Pi-Hsun Shih; it’s like being at her concert. For me, this week’s outstanding selection was Norwegian composer Ola Gjelto’s thunderous “Tundra.” And I am always awed by the great jobs our Worship Associates do to welcome us and help us to be where we should be in the service. **Thank you, Julie Grace, one of our relatively new Worship Associates.**

THE LITTLE FRIEND by Donna Tartt

The second novel by Donna Tartt, bestselling author of *The Goldfinch* (winner of the 2014 Pulitzer Prize), *The Little Friend* is a grandly ambitious and utterly riveting novel of childhood, innocence and evil.

The setting is Alexandria, Mississippi, where one Mother's Day a little boy named Robin Cleve Dufresnes was found hanging from a tree in his parents' yard. Twelve years later Robin's murder is still unsolved and his family remains devastated. So it is that Robin's sister Harriet—unnervingly bright, insufferably determined, and unduly influenced by the fiction of Kipling and Robert Louis Stevenson--sets out to unmask his killer. Aided only by her worshipful friend Hely, Harriet crosses her town's rigid lines of race and caste and burrows deep into her family's history of loss. Israel/Palestine: An Inclusive Vision will be the theme of a presentation by Hatim Kanaaneh and Robert Gelbach at the Unitarian Society of Hartford on Sunday, May 22, 2016, from 6:00 PM – 8:00 PM. Hatim and Robert will discuss the underlying roots of the ongoing Israel/Palestine conflict, the terrible toll that it is taking on the civilian populations, and the proactive steps that must be taken to establish a durable peace and equal justice for all. We will allow ample time for an interactive Q&A session.



Presenters: Hatim Kanaaneh was born and raised in the Palestinian village of Arrabeh in Galilee. He was appointed as Sub-district Physician, heading the region's governmental health office which serves over 50,000 Palestinian citizens of Israel. In his efforts to institute and expand community health services, Mr. Kanaaneh (now retired) found himself at odds with the Israeli central

authority, which led to his establishing an NGO, the Galilee Society for Health Research and Services.

Robert Gelbach, Professor Emeritus (Political Science, SCSU), Co-Chair of the New Haven Chapter of Jewish Voice for Peace, and former Executive Director of Trauma Recovery. Trauma Recovery brought a new evidence-based trauma therapy to teach to Palestinian clinicians. Its goal is to bring sustainable capacity to the occupied territories for the treatment of child and adult PTSD.
