Forward Together - We sang "This Little Light of Mine" as we left the Sanctuary on September 11, 2016, to gather around our Peace Pole on the front lawn. There we observed a moment of silence to remember the tragedy that was the World Trade center bombings 15 years ago.

There, its creator, John Bengtson, led us in rededicating our eight - year-old Peace Pole. It is a beautiful hand-carved wooden six-sided pole with the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth" carved in six different languages. Our ceremony included words of wisdom read by children and adults, such as "If you want to make peace, don't talk to your friends; talk to your enemies." This tradition began in Japan in 1955; there are now more than 100,000 poles around the world in over 80 countries, with the same message in anywhere from 4 to 16 languages carved on them.

Throughout our country's day of remembrance, ceremonies stressed the importance of kindness, community, care, compassion, decency, peace and love. And so it was at the Unitarian Society of Hartford. Rev. Cathy said although we "live in a world not in peace," we repeat the commitment from our Great Covenant every Sunday "to dwell together in peace."

Rev. Cathy reminded us that North Carolina passed House Bill 2 (HB 2), known as the "bathroom bill." Although much attention is focused on the Bill's rule that people may only use bathrooms matching their sex listed on their birth certificates, she said the bill goes far beyond that. It codifies discrimination into law. It removes local control on wages. It nullifies local state ordinances that would have expanded protections for the LGBT community.

"It is time for a moral revival, not in a narrow issue but in broad and deep care for the poor, sick, and strangers," Rev. Cathy said. A narrow social morality allows fear to capture and distract, and the underlying issues are ignored. Fear, she said, is not rational, but is real and legitimate, even if unfounded (she confessed to her own real fear of snakes), and we often react with disbelief or outrage. Without hope, people act out often in unhealthy ways.

Rev. Cathy was among those gathered at Connecticut's executive building at 11 a.m. Monday to be part of a country-wide Moral Day of Action led by Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II, founder of the Moral Monday Movement in North Carolina, and Sister Simone Campbell, leader of the "Nuns on the Bus" and executive director of the Catholic Social Justice lobby. This is part of a national tour to deliver a "Higher Ground Moral Declaration" at state capitols to elected leaders to "move away from extremist politics and policies that benefit the few and move toward policies that are just and fair and guarantee a better life for the majority of the people."

Rev. Cathy urged USH members to join her. A moral and ethically just society is possible, she said, and we cannot give up on the heart of our democracy. "Let us take our morality to the ballot box in November... The challenge becomes our defibrillator, shaking our democracy back to health."

Other good stuff. Joan Nicoll-Senft, who has been volunteering in USH's religious education department for the past 15 years since her kids were very young, currently continues as a teacher in Pre-K to second grade. She said there is no better place to shape the UU Principles, especially with younger kids, and help them learn to share, use kind words and be brave. She reminded us that teachers and assistants are still needed and asked for volunteers.

We welcomed Isaac Reguera, a Masters student at Hartt and our new accompanist, during his first Sunday with us. And we got to hear some great examples of his robust playing, from Schumann to Handel to Bob Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind." Welcome aboard, Isaac.

Hearing Loop Technology Coming to the Sanctuary Bringing Clear Sound to the Hearing Challenged ~ The Unitarian Society of Hartford takes a good deal of pride in its history of accommodations for the disabled. In recent years we have added an elevator, a chancel lift, wheel chair accessibility for visitors, and seating in pew cuts where chairs with substantial arms or wheel chairs may be used. Various hearing aid devices have found use. The late Carolyn Cartland was a leader in realizing many of these improvements.

In recent years, installation of hearing loop technology has been added to venues, particularly in Europe, and is increasingly being added to public places in the United States.


“An estimated 38 million people in the U.S. are hearing impaired. Put another way, more than one out of every 10 of us have hearing loss that affects our ability to enjoy films, lectures and other public presentations or decipher public announcements at places such as airports and sports stadiums. As our population ages, hearing loss will become even more wide-spread. Over the next 19 years, 10,000 Americans will turn 65 every single day. Of these aging Baby Boomers, as many as 50% will have issues with hearing loss, according to Shanahan Intelligent Sound & Video Integration, the company we have selected to install the USH Hearing Loops.

The loops themselves will be under the carpet surrounding the pews on either side of the Sanctuary thus making no change to the aesthetics. These loops connected to our sound system will produce a signal capable of reaching hearing aids with telecoils, a feature of some 70 percent of hearing aids being manufactured today, and becoming more common every year. This technology

delivers sound from a person's hearing aid in a pure undistorted form because the hearing aid has already been customized for a person's specific kind of hearing loss.

This project has been under consideration for several years. Building and Grounds has determined to move forward with the project at this time because all the necessary prior steps have been taken and the project will realize a goal of the AIM Task Force currently working on such issues. The congregation has underway a multi-year effort to gain accreditation from the UUA as a church that's particularly accessible to and inclusive of people with physical, mental and psychological disabilities. This work is guided by the AIM task force and is done with close cooperation between appropriate groups in the church. The total project cost will be very close to \$7,450, divided among equipment, installation, carpet work, training and related matters.

Various individuals have offered to support this work with earmarked donations. If you would like to do this, your contribution will be welcomed; just mark your donations for the Meeting House Hearing Loops. Some of us have thought donations honoring Carolyn Cartland might be of interest to USH members and friends. During her time with us, Carolyn was a vigorous advocate for various changes to meet the needs of people with different disabilities. –**Submitted by David Newton**
