Sunday Service Recap by Kayla Costenoble
"We Light This Chalice for the Energy of Action"

“Where will your breath guide you this week?” Rev. Erica Richmond asked during her sermon at the USH. Recently installed as our first Affiliated Community Minister, Rev. Erica serves as Palliative Care Chaplain for Hartford Hospital in her role as a UU Community Minister serving the larger community beyond our church. Her sermon’s topic was on, appropriately, the “energy of action” words in our weekly Chalice lighting.

Rev. Erica definitely began her formal affiliation with us not with a whimper but a bang. She, together with UU member Judy Sullivan and six other protestors, were among those arrested by the Hartford police on October 10 (Moral Monday CT) for blocking traffic in front of the mayor’s house, being noisy and, in her case, attempting to take pictures as they protested, in her words, “the disgraceful and inhumane police behavior...of a white Hartford officer stomping on the head of an already subdued suspect.”

So what is the connection between breathing and protesting? The importance of breathing was an integral part of the service. Rev. Erica told a story to the many youngsters crowded around the Chancel steps about a grumpy cow named Peter who was having a particularly bad day. His grandfather gave him a mason jar filled with glitter and sparkles, filled it with water, shook the jar, and told Peter to take deep breaths and continue doing that until the sparkles sank to the bottom. Maybe we all have to find and use our own special calming jars.

Rev. Erica’s words introducing our Turning Inward time were a meditation by Rev. Samuel Trumbore of the UU Society of Albany:

Let us turn inward now
 Feel the rhythm of the breath...
 Letting go of yesterday and tomorrow...
 There is safety here in the rhythm of the breath...
 Cultivate inner peace and inner safety in this sanctuary...”

“The onslaught of news can overwhelm us,” and make us wonder if we have the energy to move forward, Rev. Erica said. The struggle with hate speech during the election cycle can feel like too much. She used words from Rev. Carter Heyward, Episcopal priest, lesbian feminist theologian, and professor: “We seldom feel brave with what is happening in the world around us. Courage is a radical spiritual act and love is what we do with our lives.”

Courage, love, AND anger are all important, Rev. Erica said. Anger is not the opposite of love, she said. Active in Showing Up for Racial Justice (SURJ) and Black Lives Matter, the cycle of violent confrontation around the country and in Hartford makes her angry and pushes her to take risks. Change and a spiritual commitment to radical action are called for.

In her work in palliative care, Rev. Erica said she can tell when someone is approaching the end of life by their breath. “Breath soothes our soul in ways that words can not.” We live with the false notion that we have to be stressed to be successful. We can “breathe ourselves into a different state,” calm and restore ourselves and provide us with the energy to act. Sitting in their holding cell on October 10, Rev. Erica and her partners sang the Meditation Hymn we sang in today’s service: “When I breathe in, I’ll breathe in peace; When I breathe out, I’ll breathe out love.”

We had a full and robust choir Sunday, and they did justice to Norwegian-born and Juilliard-educated Oja Gjelo’s “Ubi Caritas,” a Georgian chant whose words include:

Let us love each other with a sincere heart...

Beware, lest we be divided in mind.

Let evil impulses stop, let controversy cease.

"I appreciate church in a whole new way after this past Sunday, because it was our (Revs) weekend off and I got to attend church as A Parent, solo-parenting for the weekend, and Someone Else Spent Time with My Kid for free (or pay/pledge-what-we-can) (in a thoughtfully-prepared Religious Education class) for a full 40 minutes while I got to soak in a profound, beautifully-crafted sermon by the Rev. Erica Richmond and gorgeous music (Ubi Caritas in four-part harmony) from the Choir, directed by Rebecca Grace Pacuk. I mean: I just got to Sit There. It was fabulous. And oh: when the Order of Service has a coloring sheet on the cover, we need to prepare to hand out more crayons and have more copies! Good stuff! Deep thanks to all involved"

Position Description



The Religious Education (RE) & Ministers' Assistant will work two Sundays a month with the Religious Education Program supporting the Director of Religious Education (DRE) by setting up classrooms, tracking attendance, supporting teachers and being the "face" of RE when the

DRE is away or unavailable. The Assistant will also provide administrative and filing support to the Co-Ministers.





Brooklyn by Colm Tóibín

Committed to a quiet life in little Enniscorthy, Ireland, the industrious young Eilis Lacey reluctantly finds herself swept up in an unplanned adventure to America, engineered by the family priest and her glamorous, "ready for life" sister, Rose.



Eilis's determination to embrace the spirit of the journey despite her trepidation--especially on behalf of Rose, who has sacrificed her own chance of leaving--makes a bittersweet center for Brooklyn. Colm Tóibín's spare portrayal of this contemplative girl is achingly lovely, and every sentence rings with truth. Readers will find themselves swept across the Atlantic with Eilis to a boarding house in Brooklyn where she painstakingly adapts to a new life, reinventing herself and her surroundings in the letters she writes home.

Just as she begins to settle in with the help of a new love, tragedy calls her home to Enniscorthy, and her separate lives suddenly and painfully merge into one. Tóibín's haunted heroine glows on the page, unforgettably and lovingly rendered, and her story reflects the lives of so many others exiled from home.


Logistics:
