Sunday Service Recap

June 4, 2017

"Staying Your Course," by Rev. Heather Rion Starr

"Years ago--like, 12 or more--I was serving as a Chaplain Resident at Providence Portland Medical Center in Oregon, with the extraordinary team there of some 18 staff chaplains of many different faith backgrounds. The on-call pager rotated amongst the crew of residents and interns, and it was my turn that day with the small-but-substantial black weight in my hands. Here is all that I remember: I must have been me--not all that different than I am today, though somewhat slimmer, wearing different clothes, perhaps with slightly longer hair. Not yet -- not even nearly yet -- a parent. The hospital halls must have been carpeted in their muted tones. The pager must have gone off, with its red light and its brisk voice from the switchboard desk. And there was a room to which I was called, a conferencing-with-family sort-of-room, where family was sitting anxiously. The family was there, waiting there for their person--their much-loved husband, spouse, and father--to come out of open-heart surgery. And I must have walked there, to that room. I didn't know any of their names yet, and I don't remember them now. I do remember that a doctor came in, in the white coat he must have been wearing. I remember that he must have spoken. Because then, after telling the family that their much-loved husband, spouse, and father had not survived his heart being restarted, that his heart has refused to start again, I remember, most of all, one of the adult sons exploding in rage and punching the walls of the little conferencing room, over-and-over again, not more than a few feet from me, or from the doctor. And then I don't remember the doctor being there. And I'm sure I stayed for a while longer, but what else was there to say? And while I must have done some things in order to be helpful and I must have done some things in order to fulfill my duties as a Chaplain, what I most remember was probably not for days later, when my Supervisor spoke some powerful wisdom to me as I cried about this whole experience in her office.

What I remember with crystal clarity is her saying: "Heather: this is not your tragedy."

This is not your tragedy.

...I think we are all, more and more of us these days, holding and carrying extraordinary grief and pain, sorrow and agony, on behalf of so many others. We have got to let some of that go. We have got to set some of that down. We have got to remind ourselves that not all of these tragedies are actually our's to carry. And if we overburden ourselves with everyone else's tragedies, we will become prematurely buried in grief. We have so much life to live and growth to grow and work yet to do, dear ones. Our lives are for living.

In the classic mantra from Rabbi Edwin Friedman:

When you feel yourself getting blown about this summer--

'Know where you stand.

Know and stay on your course.

Manage your reactivity.

Stay connected.'

...In the weeks ahead, press on with what you know is nourishing the goodness in you, keeping on through the less structured and sometimes unsettling long days of summer. I hope you will spend the summer moving into the unknown, with me. What might we do together this next congregational year that is something very different and new for all of us? How might we explore together the "beyond" that can come with you having Co-Ministers entering our fourth year with you? Instead of (simply) trying to keep things going and shoring things up for another year at USH, what might we do with the incredible resources of this Meeting House and this community to serve the larger region and confront the uncertain future, together?

What might your summer daydreams unfurl?"

CELEBRATE SUMMER SOLSTICE JUNE 18 –

The first people to keep calendars observed the turning of the year – the position of the moon – the motions of the planet – the growing times -- that marked the changing of the seasons.

In particular, to lead our 12-15 member Chancel Choir, provide piano (or other instrumental/organ) accompaniment during Sunday worship services, and provide oversight to our Music Ministry (coordinating guest musicians, managing the budget, and leading the visioning and rebuilding of our Music Ministry).

We are open to the possibility of splitting this position into Choir Director and Accompanist – we welcome your application if you are only a Choir Director or Accompanist.

The Unitarian Society of Hartford is a growing, spiritually alive, welcoming, and justice-seeking Unitarian Universalist congregation of 200 adult members and 60 children, with an average Sunday attendance of 160 and a strong musical tradition. We look forward to welcoming and sharing ministry with a Director of Music Ministry who will harness our voices and our songs to nourish spirits and inspire us to live our faith in the world.

About our Music Ministry:

Our Chancel Choir consists of a dozen active members and 4 paid Choral Scholars from the University of Hartford. We have an innovative partnership with UHart in which we have a student as Composer-In-Residence each spring who composes music specifically for our Choir. Lay-led music-related programs at the Meeting House include a performing arts concert series, a monthly folk sing-a-long, and a group called Meeting House Folk that plays folk and pop songs in worship several times a year. We have many talented in-house musicians, including a drummer, professional violinist, and a variety of other instrumentalists. Our piano is a

Mason Hamlin piano. Our organ is an Austin three manual 57 rank instrument with full MIDI capability.

- * Bring experience conducting volunteer or congregational choirs in a wide range of repertoire with spiritual grounding, musical excellence, creativity, patience, and joy

News from the Board Retreat: Margaret Leicach shared this observation following the Board Retreat on June 2nd and 3rd, for incoming, continuing and outgoing Board members. “The vision and path of this congregation are in such good hands! We have an incoming Board that is creative, talented and passionately dedicated to the vitality, integrity, and future of this congregation. They understand that reaching our goals, becoming what we envision that we could be, isn’t easy and doesn’t lend itself to quick fixes. A little history from Senexet House

"I received a phone call several weeks ago, from Mary Ella Holst who introduced herself as the historian for All Souls UU in New York. She was seeking a photograph of Thelma Chickering Williams, founder of Senexet House. Ms. Holst has been commissioned to write a history of the Unitarian Women's Federation (now UU

Women's Federation) established in 1890. The federation, according to Ms. Holst, was founded primarily to be recognized by the denomination as an organization permitted to attend the General Assemblies. Up until being accepted as an official organization, the various womens' groups had no voice - literally women were unable to speak, no vote in the business of the denomination although they were very actively involved. In 1932, Velma Chickering Williams wrote the constitution which was accepted by the Women's Federation and submitted to the denomination which subsequently gave the organization and therefore, all women, the right to participate fully in the denomination. In 1934, Ms. Williams opened Senexet House, our retreat house in Woodstock, CT. Did I mention there are three candidates for President of the UUA this year - all of them women!" ~ **Kit Northup, Manager, Senexet House**
